1. What is the definition of symbolism?

Symbolism occurs when a concrete object represents an abstract idea. The use of specific objects, images, numbers, characters, and/or settings to represent abstract ideas present in a story.

- Watch for something that stands out or is repeated numerous times
- Find something it resembles
- Examine the author's attitude towards it
 - 3. Give **three examples** of symbols from the stories we read/watched together and describe what they represent. Be sure to back up with <u>evidence from the text</u>. **Evidence may vary, but should include quotes or specific examples from the text.**

| The monkey's paw | In "The Tale of the Monkey's Paw," the monkey's paw could represent greed, fate, or even death. For example, the Whites used the monkey's paw to wish for 300 pounds, even if though they didn't need it. By doing so, they eventually lost their son, showing how their greediness cost their son his life. |
| The elevator | In "The Elevator," the elevator could represent Martin's fear. The elevator is the setting that brings Martin the most anxiety and is a large reason why Martin is so scared of the fat lady. |
| The black cat | In "The Black Cat," the black cat could represent death. The black cat brought about its own death and then the second black cat was the cause of the narrator's wife's death as well as the narrator's. |

 - Two siblings get into an argument at home.
 - Narrator from "The Tell-Tale Heart" and the old man with the creepy eye.
 - 2. Person vs. Self
 - Deciding whether to go out and get in trouble with your parents or stay in and finish your homework.
 - Martin deciding whether or not to take the stairs or the elevator.
 - 3. Person vs. Society
 - Unhappy with the laws of the government, a group of people decide to peacefully protest to make change.
 - 4. Person vs. Nature
 - A natural disaster destroys a town, forcing the citizens to rebuild and start over.
- 8. What tragic childhood events influenced Poe's writing?

He was orphaned at a young age (both of his parents died); he was separated from his siblings; his high school sweetheart married someone who was wealthier and better suited for her than Poe.

9. How would you describe Poe's style of writing? Explain with examples.

Poe's style of writing can be described as being dark and suspenseful. He creates this through his use of repetition, suspenseful plots, and creepy imagery. Examples will vary, but should highlight Poe's writing style.
